Lafayette County has begun a program of installing LPR cameras on the major highways entering and exiting the county. This program has seen successful convictions of crimes utilizing data obtained from these cameras. The Harmontown community has a high crime/incident rate for the county but has no LPR's for Hwy 310 which is the major means of egress and ingress for the community.

2. The process or method used to identify the <u>PREPAREDNESS GAP(s)</u> (e.g., specific real-training events, training exercises, threat assessment, or after-action reports). The method used for identifying this resource gap includes the following:

- 1) Success of LPR's in other areas of the county
- 2) Lack of LPR's in the proposed community
- 3) Number of crime reports for this specific area of the county
- 3. Describe how the requested funding, resources, training, or equipment will increase your agency capabilities to address these PREPAREDNESS GAP(s).

The placement of 2 LPR's at both ends of Hwy 310 where it enters the county, will allow information to be gathered of the vehicles entering this area. That information then could be used to assist in the identification of individuals perpetrating crimes in this community. Much of this is criminal activity coming out of the Memphis area.

4. Explain how this project will support TERRORISM PREPAREDNESS and RESPONSE for the agency?

The continuation of advancing the LPR program in the county will continue to increase the rate and speed of solving crimes within Lafayette County. Because this data can be accessed and utilized by other agencies, and counties, it will assist in the response and preparedness of these entities as well. Although the impact of this project goes beyond terrorism, it directly affects the ability to identify threats and track their movements in and out of the county.

PREPAREDNESS GAPS

Lafayette County operates a shooting range that is used to train and certify over 20 law enforcement agencies. It also used by church groups to train their security teams. The facility lacks a shooting house that can be reconfigured to simulate different real life structures and scenarios.

This resource gap, allows for training deficiencies. The ability to reconfigure the shoot house design will allow responders to be prepared for different scenarios.

2. The process or method used to identify the <u>PREPAREDNESS GAP(s)</u> (e.g., specific real-training events, training exercises, threat assessment, or after-action reports). Use specific data and provide examples to illustrate how these <u>PREPAREDNESS GAP(s)</u> have impacted your agency's operations.

The gap was identified in training exercises where trainers were unable to simulate real world situations like school configurations, church, and other specific designs. It was also noted that other training facilities, that were not feasible for these agencies to attend, had those resources.

3. Describe how the requested funding, resources, training, or equipment will increase your agency capabilities to address these PREPAREDNESS GAP(s).

Funding would be utilized to purchase a non-ballistic, modular shooting house kit that could be quickly reconfigured to simulate known soft target locations. This training kit would be utilized by the 20 plus LE agencies plus church and non-profit groups for their security training. The more realistic training will help the community build resilience in its response to events, increase the operational coordination of agencies in their response, and further advance public/private usage of this resource that is true to life training.

4. Explain how this project will support TERRORISM PREPAREDNESS and RESPONSE for the agency?

This project will support the training of responders for domestic terrorist, and gang related events. The project will allow for simulation of soft target scenarios by each of the agencies utilizing the training site.
